

What is the "Case for 8"?

The "Case for 8" is the City's initiative to increase the number of sworn officers from 40 to 48, aiming to enhance the safety and well-being of everyone who lives, works, and plays in our community.

In recent years, we've consistently heard concerns about the perception that Fort Dodge is unsafe and the need for additional police officers. The need for additional police officers is something both the community and City officials agree on.

Currently, Fort Dodge falls behind similar-sized cities in terms of the number of officers. By adding these eight officers, we'll align more closely with comparable municipalities, providing more dedicated staff to address ongoing criminal activity and improve overall safety.

Fort Dodge residents have made their desire to vote on this crucial issue known and a special election is set for September 10, 2024.

What is the goal of the "Case for 8" initiative?

The main goal of adding more officers is to boost community safety, improve our policing effectiveness, and increase engagement with the community. Like you, we want to make ALL of Fort Dodge safe.

We're looking to add four officers to our patrol units. This will help us respond to calls more efficiently and ensure public safety. The idea is to provide more comprehensive coverage and reduce response times.

Three of the new officers will be part of a newly created Community Action Team. Unlike regular patrol units, this team will focus on being proactive rather than reactive. They'll target specific issues within the community, engage with residents, understand their concerns, and work together to address them. It's all about building trust and fostering a stronger relationship between the police and the community.

We'd also be adding an overnight detective. This role is crucial for timely and effective investigations of incidents during the night. We can address and solve crimes more promptly with continuous, around-the-clock investigative coverage.

We recognize that our officers are more than just cops; they're individuals with lives outside of work. They have families; they're volunteers, caregivers, and active community members. Achieving a work-life balance has been challenging over the past few years. Our officers support us 24/7, so we must support them by increasing our police force. Adding more officers will ensure that our current team has the necessary time for rest, family, and personal well-being. This balance is essential for maintaining a healthy, effective, committed police force.



What is a franchise fee?

A franchise is like giving special permission to a company to provide certain services, like water, electricity and gas, within the city. The city grants this permission because it's not practical or efficient for multiple companies to build separate infrastructures for the same services. Imagine having several gas pipelines from different companies running to each home – it just wouldn't make sense.

Franchise fees are like rental payments companies make to the city for using public property and right-of-ways. It's similar to if someone wanted to set up shop on your property – you wouldn't let them do it without charging them a fee, right? It's the same concept.

Franchise fees are crucial because they compensate the city for using its property. The money from these fees can be used to fund city services and projects, contributing to its upkeep and improvement.


What's this going to cost me?

The franchise fee would be an extra cost that goes beyond what our tax-supported Police Department already covers. Tax money that the City collects goes toward a lot of different things - roads, parks, public services, you name it. It's a lot to cover, and there's only so much to go around, even more so now that the state has made legislative changes that directly impact traditional funding sources.

We've been hearing loud and clear from residents and businesses that they want all of Fort Dodge to be safe. This allows us to achieve this collective goal.

The franchise fee is a way to generate additional revenue specifically for our police department without having to rely on already stretched tax dollars. It ensures we can focus on making all of Fort Dodge safe without taking away from other important services and projects.

For the average home, the monthly increase would be about \$4.82 for electricity and \$1.08 for natural gas based on current bills. So, in total, it's around **\$5.90 a month**. These fees would only apply to **MidAmerican Energy customers**. The estimated annual revenue from the fee is \$1.8 million. 100% of those dollars would be used to cover the increase of wages, training, insurance and equipment costs necessary to boost the Fort Dodge Police Department from 40 to 48 sworn officers.





I don't use police services much. What's in it for me?

There's a lot in it for everyone, including you. Public investment, like funding for police, infrastructure, and community services, is crucial for stimulating private investment and generating tax revenue. It creates a beneficial cycle for the whole community.
